The event took place at the Melvindale, Michigan, American Legion. Many of his friends and family gathered to honor this gentleman.

After serving in the United States Navy in World War II and serving more than 20 years as Chaplain at his American Legion post, Bill does deserve this honor and much more.

For more than 40 years, Bill served the American Legion and the Veterans Administration as a volunteer. He and his wife, Helen, brought up 4 children, Keith, Gary, Brian, and Cheryl, who are immensely proud of their parents.

Bill is so humble that while working as a divisional forms representative at Ford Motor Company he learned that when you earned a college degree, your salary would be raised, but he told William Ford, Jr., "It's okay, you pay me enough already."

Bill and his wife lived in the same home in Melvindale since 1951, and he is still there, although his wife passed away in 2011.





After his wife passed, Bill could no longer bring himself to go to the American Legion Hall because of the many fond memories of her. The two of them would put flags on the graves of soldiers and volunteer at veterans events. Bill especially liked being the caller at Bingo games.

Although the surprise at the American Legion was bittersweet, it was lively and fun-filled as well. Bill and his family had many laughs and a few tears. It was truly an evening to cherish. Thank you, Bill, for your service.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH (EDUCATING OUR COMMUNITY HOW TO BEST SUPPORT VETERANS)



THE VISION:

"Serve our community with much love, integrity, and excellence." Pastor Bishop Edgar L. Vann, Second Ebenezer Church

IN THE BEGINNING: In 2016, under the guidance of a grant from The St. Francis Fund of Felician Services, Inc., Angela Hospice hosted a roundtable discussion with leaders from the southeast Michigan African American community. Highlighted were the significant gaps in care for the African American population as they approach end of life as compared with the Caucasian population during the same phase of life.

Roundtable participants suggested that a cooperative effort between African American faith communities could improve this discrepancy, and the African American Church Empowerment Project was born. The cooperative effort would help the communities train their own advocates with a goal toward becoming "End-of-Life Care Advocates." The training touches on the facts of care, details resources available to families in the community, and helps nurture community members toward self-advocacy.

In 2017, the project began successfully with members from Second Baptist Church, Greektown. This summer Second Ebenezer Church in Detroit joined the effort, as their participants learned general hospice principles and engaged in role playing in a Christian context. This training prepared them to have end-of-life conversations with other congregants and their own friends and family.

Participants also learned the components of grief and loss, and had the opportunity to ask questions of Dr. James Boal, Angela Hospice Medical Officer, on the medical aspects of hospice and palliative care.

WHAT THEY LEARNED: Jayann Washington, Second Ebenezer Church, EPICS Ministry Leader, and coordinator of the empowerment project: "Because of this training I will use my family and friends as sounding boards so that I can become more confident in speaking with others outside of my comfort zone."

Denise Caparaotta, Second Ebenezer Church: "I will use this training to help others that are in hospice in my church and my friends as well...I am more prepared to assist."

Lucy Bryant, Second Ebenezer Church: "I will put my wishes in writing so my family will not feel bad about making a decision for my care."

Renee Welch, Second Ebenezer Church: "After learning about hospice/palliative care, my perspective has totally changed, for I know now it is actually more beneficial to our loved ones instead of an abrupt end to life. In moving forward, I believe I have the tools needed for conversations concerning hospice that I never had before."

WHAT WE LEARNED: Diane Smith, Angela Hospice Mission Integration Director, said, "The amazing, loving people of Second Ebenezer welcomed us into their church and were willing to tackle tough topics. They engaged honestly, sharing their stories fearlessly. They came to the table with one goal: learning all they could about end-of-life care in order to support their own and their church families through the challenging and often emotionally painful journey at life's end. They were committed to the process. They affirmed the power of faith and hope to sustain through life's trials. And they did it all joyfully!"

PASSION PROJECT THE SOUL

Two of Angela Hospice's volunteers have given our patients and families a wonderful gift: a beautiful butterfly garden on the grounds of the Angela Hospice Care Center. It's meant to be more than just something pretty to look at. It's a place to experience nature in a way that can soothe the soul.

Like most of our selfless volunteers, these two weren't looking for any recognition when they made this generous gesture, and in fact, they wish to remain anonymous. So let's call them Oliver and Eve.

It was Oliver who first had the idea for a butterfly garden. He had been reading about native plants, and one day when he was working at the Care Center, the idea struck him: what about installing a butterfly garden at Angela Hospice?

"If you've ever had something really sad happen in your life and you're kind of just sitting there contemplating it, you notice the simplest things, things you never would have noticed before," Oliver said. "And I think that's what gives you peace. That's what I hope this does.

"People can just sit there and reflect. And if they see a bee hopping flower to flower, or a hummingbird, or a butterfly...it's the little, simple things when you're sad and you're grieving. Sometimes those things give you comfort."

When Oliver presented his idea, it was met with enthusiasm and gratitude. With approval to pursue the project, Oliver and Eve hired Plymouth Nursery to come up with a design.

"The whole time I'd been kind of thinking about it and praying on it that somebody from Plymouth Nursery knows about Angela Hospice," Oliver said, "So I don't have to try to explain the special feeling this place has."

He was delighted when he met Vicki from Plymouth Nursery and she told him, "I've got a history with this whole area." She went on to tell him that when she was giving her thesis presentation for her MBA at Madonna, Sister Giovanni (Angela Hospice's foundress) was giving her presentation on hospice at the same time. Vicki said she was inspired by Sister, knowing how many people would be helped by her vision.

"I thought, 'Well, there you go. Prayers are answered,'" Oliver said.


When Vicki and her team got to working on the plan for the butterfly garden, they came up with a design in the shape of butterfly wings. Eve and Oliver loved the design and when a paved pathway was added, they knew it would be a special place for patients and families to visit.

"My aunt always smelled roses, which would remind her of her daughter that died," Eve said. "I think even the smells and the sights are triggering for people....hopefully they enjoy sitting out there and looking, and then reflecting on somebody that they love."

And if visitors should see a butterfly while they're there, "It's kind of like when you see a ray of sunshine," Eve said. "It just puts you in a good frame of mind."

The garden is positioned just outside the Care Center's A-Wing. It features many perennials, including hydrangeas, rose of Sharon, and butterfly bushes that will attract butterflies, bumble bees, and hummingbirds.

Thank you Eve and Oliver for using your passion and resources to create a peaceful place to bring comfort and beauty to others.




SWEET, PRECIOUS TIME

HOSPICE LOVES ON THE WHOLE FAMILY







DEBBIE BENNETT was called to be a steadfast wife to husband Thomas and a devoted mother to their children, Christopher, Kelly, and Robin. She has relied on God to get through the hard times her family has faced, and has been grateful that Angela Hospice was there too, when she really needed support.

In 1989, at the age of 12, Christopher, her oldest child, was diagnosed with a rare neurological disease called Friedreich's Ataxia (FA). Chris was a smart and funny music-lover, and accomplished artist who was beloved by his family and many friends. By his junior year in high school, he began to use a wheelchair. As with many diseases of the nervous system, there has never been a cure or effective treatment for FA.

Debbie and her family enlisted Angela Hospice's help to care for Chris before he passed away in 2004. He was just 26 years old.

"I didn't know what to expect...hospice comes in and does so much more than care for a sick person, they love on the whole family," Debbie said. "It makes it a sweeter, more precious time for your family as a whole. They can celebrate every minute being together.

"When Chris was in Angela Hospice home care he had a young male nurse who shared music and tattoos with him and became like family." Debbie said, "When Chris was in the Care Center they treated him like a king!"

Just this year, Angela Hospice was once again called to serve the Bennett family, when Debbie's husband was diagnosed with cancer. Tom's calling was as a history teacher and Pastor of Emmaus Road Bible Church. He also worked at Detroit Diesel for more than 22 years. His children and grandchildren adored him. Tom looked forward to seeing his son again in Heaven. Tom passed away in April. He and Debbie had been married 43 years.

Debbie is thankful that hospice walked alongside her and her family through all this.

After Chris died, Debbie went to one of our bereavement groups, which are funded through the generosity of our donors, and found comfort in sharing with and leaning on other grieving parents. Now, although she still works full time at NorthRidge Church in Plymouth, she finds time to go to an Angela Hospice support group again. She understands the power of talking to others in similar stages of grief.

"The loss of our son and then 14 years later the loss of my husband have been two of the hardest events of my life," she shared, "but even in that pain, my family has been blessed that Angela Hospice was and still is there for us."

Debbie cherishes her family and is proud of the women her two daughters have become.

Kelly, now 36, is Debbie's middle child. She is healthy, married, and has three beautiful children of her own. Her twin boys were born prematurely and have developmental disabilities not related to FA. She teaches all of her children that they can be proud of who they are and all they can give to the world.

Robin, the youngest child, now 32, also lives with FA. Robin is independent and spirited. She graduated from Eastern Michigan University in 2009 with a degree in creative writing and theatre. She now works at 4th Wall Theatre, where she is an instructor for young people with developmental disabilities. She sits on two disability-related councils advising the governor and State of Michigan. Robin is proud to give voice to the independence and dignity of all people with disabilities, just like her brother taught her.

Ann-Patrice Foley, Angela Hospice Social Worker said, "I think about Debbie and her significant losses, and yet, she continues to bring warmth and love to others. Her deeply empathetic sharing during years of attending our support group for grieving parents (dubbed 'Heartstrings' by the parents), showed me what a blessing she is to so many!"

LIGHT UP A LIFE AUCTION & GALA


